- 8> Wisdom Athena's Roman equivalent is Minerva.
- 9> Tuscan Tuscan is a primitive Italic architectural form.
- 10> Sparta The Peloponnesian War marked an end to the golden age of Greece.
- 11> Music and Poetry Apollo had a twin sister named Artemis.
- 12> Homer The Iliad contains 15,693 lines.
- 13> Hestia Hestia was a virgin goddess of the hearth and architecture.
