**Answers:**

1> Dutch - Until it was dissolved, the Dutch Antilles included three groups of islands about 880 km north. Saba, St. Eustatius and St. Maarten.

2> Marseilles - Counting metro areas, Lyon is France's #2 city.

3> South Africa - It is named for the whales found there. Walvis Bay had technically been part of the old Cape Colony but is now a crucially important port for Namibia.

4> Gibraltar - Morocco wants Ceuta back from Spain. And Spain wants Gibraltar back from Britain.

5> Haiti - The other side of the island is the Dominican Republic.

6> Hillside slums - About a fifth of the population lives in them.

7> Panama Canal - Going through the 51-mile Panama Canal saves 3000 miles on a trip from the Caribbean to the Pacific, but oddly enough, you would make that trip southeast.

8> France - Official busts of Marianne have been based on Brigitte Bardot, Catherine Deneuve and Laetitia Casta.

9> Aral Sea - It was once the world's fourth largest inland body of water, but irrigation projects have sunk it by as much as 40% since the 1960s.

10> Spain - The monarch's kids are called the infante or infanta, depending on whether they are boys or girls.

11> Shannon - It is in Ireland.

12> Trafalgar Square - This was originally going to be called King William the Fourth's Square, but George Ledwell Taylor suggested its current name.

13> Japan - In the 1800s, the Japanese adapted agnatic primogeniture, which is the idea that the inheritance goes to the oldest surviving male child.

14> Indonesia - It's the western half of the island of New Guinea. The rest is the country called Papua New Guinea.
