- 1> Alex Haley Alex Haley was charged with plagiarism in separate lawsuits, each filed in the spring of 1977.
- 2> Richard III He was the last York king.
- 3> The Hobbit The Hobbit was published on 21 September 1937.
- 4> A Confederacy of Dunces After Simon and Schuster rejected it, because it "isn't really about anything", Toole never sent it out again.
- 5> The Sun Also Rises The book is still called Fiesta in many international editions. Other possible titles included Two Lie Together, River to the Sea, and The Old Leaven.
- 6> Norman Mailer In the 1990s, CNN Headline News started calling data at the bottom of the screen 'factoids'.
- 7> DOS for Dummies Written by Dan Goodkin, DOS For Dummies nearly had a different name, as the publisher felt the 'for Dummies' tag demeaned the readers.
- 8> Miguel de Cervantes He spent five years as a slave in Algeria before his family paid his ransom, having tried four times to escape.
- 9> King Lear Larry Cook divides his farmland among his three daughters, Ginny, Rose and Caroline.
- 10> Ezra Pound He spent 25 days in an open-air cage, had some sort of nervous breakdown, and was moved to a medical tent. The Cantos describes life in the prison.
- 11> Lord Byron Her husband, William Lamb, 2nd Viscount Melbourne, became Britain's prime minister and has an Australian city named for him.
- 12> Cardinal Richelieu Although depicted as a villain, Louis XIII's cardinal restored French power. Indeed, despite the fame of the Three Musketeers, in 1616 Louis organized the Swiss Guards to protect him.
- 13> James Herriot James Herriot is the pen name of James Alfred Wight.
- 14> Peter Benchley Benchley also authored The Deep, a book about a honeymooning couple discovering two sunken treasures.
- 15> War and Peace Written by Leo Tolstoy, Newsweek ranked it first in its list of the Top 100 Books in 2009.

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
